#### CHARLES RAWLINS

The following information secured from Film 34733 929.2 7-I-551-Pt 16 Charles Rawlins enlisted in the Revolutionary War under George Washington. His two sons James and Joseph and his brother Rodric Rawlins enlisted in the war of 1812 under Andrew Jackson.

His wife Eustacie Gregory Rawlins lived at her home until after the war, when her sons came home bringing news that her husband was dead. They then moved from their home and heard nothing more of him. His wife married again to a man by the name of Noah Phillips, and raised seven children (five boys and two girls by her second marriage). Years after it was learned that Charles Rawlins was not dead; that he returned and being unable to find trace of his family had married again.

Regarding his second marriage we have no record of who he married or what became of him.

#### LIFE HISTORY OF CHARLOTTA RAWLINS DOWNS

Charlotta Rawlins Downs was born in Rutherford County, North Carolina on Christmas day 1792. She was the daughter of Charles Rawlins and Eustacis Gregory. The father of Charles Rawlins was James Moason Rawlings who came from England to the Carolinas and here he started spelling his name Rawlins. This Charles Rawlins is the progenator of Senator Rawlins and many of the prominent prople of Utah of that name. Charlotta died 23 of January, 1863 at Draper.

Charles Rawlins and two of his sons went to war together. His father James Mason Rawlins had been a soldier in the Revolutionary War. At the end of the war the two sons returned but the father was not heard of. A long time passed and all traces of his whereabouts seemed lost and he was believed dead for they ad heard he had been killed. They lived in Kentucky as this time at Danville.

Eustacia moved with her children to either Illinois or Indiana and there married Noah Phillips and by him had 5 more children Isreal, Edward, Andrew, Keen, Amanda and Nancy. By Charles Rawlins she had James, Joseph, Hosea, Rhoderick, Charlotta and Amy.

Years later a man was going thru the town in which they lived, a neightbor, and came across them. He told them shat after they had moved north with her family and her new husband, the father, Charles Rawlins, had come back in search of his family only to find them gone. He learned that she had married again and like a second Enock Ardem, MMM went away and was never heard of again. He had been ill and taken prisoner in one of the battles. His family made a great effort to locate him but in vain. This was a source of great grief to Eustacia, knowing that her husband was still alive and she having a family by both. She wondered if she would be condemned for remaining with her present husband but as they found no trace of Charles she finally contented herself that she was doing the right thing and remained with Noah ENTERMIN Phillips the rest of her life. She was the mother of 10 children. Charlotta GNK and the 3 boys joined the L.D.S. Church and pioneered to Utah.

Charlotta married about 1814 to Ezekial Downs. He was born in 1790. He was the son of Thomas Downs, a revolutionary soldier, and a grandson of Zackeriah Downs who was a miller and came from Scotland. They were with the prophet and suffered the bitter hardships and persecutions that Befell the saints at that time. Her son was the body guard of the prophet, with Issac Stewart, at the time he was martryed.

They built a nice home. With their hands in agong pinned behind them they were

fored to stand by and watch their home burned to the ground before their eyes mid the cheers and curses of the mob. Altho their trails were many they were true to the faith they had acceped. With the exception of Ezekial and one son. After the prophet was slain. Ezekial said, "This is enough. My best friend is gone. I am through." So the family divided, he staying with Sidney in Iowa and the rest coming to Utah. The son Asa Downs returned to the East and raised a large family. James and the three girls located in Draper, their farms adjoining. The firls were the most devoted of sisters. Throughout their lives their great devotion to each other was a grand sight to all who knew them. "Most inspiring" people would say. Throughout their lives they were seldon separated. James moved to Cache Valley where he raised a large family at Smithfield, Utah.

The following is taken from the RECORD BOOK OF JAKES DOWNS:

I was born in Harrison Co. Indiana July 14th. in the year of our Lord 1815 son of Ezekiel Downs and Charlotta daughter of Charles Rawlins. My great grand father Zaceriah Downs emigrated from Scotland to North Carolina before the war of Independance. Being an elderly man and owning a grist mill he was exempt from service. My grand father Thomas enlisted in his 17th. year and served during the war and marched in the hot sand till his feet bled, and dipped water in his hat as he marched along and gave to the wounded soldiers. He enlisted under General Mcdowel and fought under Washington.

My father was uneven tempered, rather on the extreme both ways. My mother was even tempered, kind, affectionate. They were well respected by their neighbors. They labored and made a good living.

We emigrated to Illinois in the fall of 128 and settled in Adams Co. in the Spring of 129, 12 miles below Quincey one of the most beautiful countries I ever saw. The land was very rich, the praries interspirst with beautiful groves of timber with singing birds and the country abounded with wild game, wild fruit, fish and honey.

My father bought calves and raised for market, bought land, fenced 160 acres, broke 100 acres and raised large crops of corn, wheat, oats, beans, potatoes, pumpkins, melons and raised hogs for market.

And in the Spring of 138 the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day-Saints was driven from Missouri. The main body crossed at Quincy and some at Hanibal. Five families

came to our place with one old wagon and a poor span of horses. We looked upon them as a poor persecuted people, took them in, gave them work and helped to feed and clothe them. They began to predict that I would be a Mormon. I laughed at the idea, but when I heard the Elders set forth the first principles of the Gospel I receive it with joy, the first one of the family.

I was baptised in October 1840 by Bishop David Evans and confirmed and had many manifestations of the truth of what I had received from time to time.

I speak of this children that you may see that the Lord chose been down to my fathers and as I was returning home taught school two months. Bought dried fruit 120 their plans to an attack on all the settlements, the next morning the road was so filled with timber the storm to save his people for the mob had laid saw a body of armed men in a little town called In a short time after that I went to West

as well as Nauvoo. When I got home I was told that all the able bodied men was called to Nauvoo. I went up with my old snotzun to see what was wanted. The Prophet rode along the ranks and saw some of the boys barefooted and he rode to some shoes and ne would foot the bill, but he was pressed upon by his enemies, backed up by appostates, that he fled to Montrose across the river with the intention of making his way to the Hocky Mountains, but his wife Emy sent for him to come back and save the people. He then said he would give himself up and die for his brethren and sisters and as he went to Carthage Jail he said he was going like a Lamb to the slaughter.

I cannot describe the scene that followed. Mobs marched through the country. I told the brethren that if we did not raise men and take them out of prison that they would be slaughtered. And when the word came I went to the woods to pray to know who was to lead the Church and when I rose up a small still voice whispered to me Brigham Young and that gave me comfort.

The heavens seemed to weep over the horrible deed for it rained so much that it drowned the crops and all nature seemed to wear a gloom. In the Spring of 145 we swapt farms with Eli D. Walker 4 miles east of Warsaw. Ours was the best farm but he wanted boot and said he would not trade and started off and I went to the woods and prayed that he might change his mind and return and trade with us. When I got to the house he rode up and said he would trade. My father moved up and put in a crop and in the summer the mob began to haul a wagon load of armed men past my father's door and fired their guns and yelled like demons and early in the fall old Co. Williams a Baptist Preacher raised 60 men, camped in the

woods 2 miles from my father's place and commenced burning houses. He sent out 12 men well armed with a bottle of whiskey in each pocket with orders to the Mormons to take their sick folks and leave. We done so, and let them burn. It was a frame, painted, and done off in good style with four good rooms and cost about 8005 where labor was very cheap. We sold the farm for 11335 less than half its worth and glad to get that to make an outfit to leave such civilization.

The Prophet Joseph Smith appeared to my Father in a dream and said to him, follow me. He followed him some distance up hill and came to a beautiful little stream of water. Now, he said stoop down and let me wash your face. He did so, then he said again, follow me. He want on a piece but the mountain was so steep he got tired and stopped.

He departed this life at Council Bluffs, in his 70th. year, I think.

In the fore-part of the winter of 145 I dreamed that I was standing in Nauvoo and I saw the Saints crossing the river to go west and others fitting up for the journey and a council of Elders was called to transact some business. Then I stood near the Temple and saw a battle fought with the mob. Then I traveled west with the main body of the Church a long distance to a large body of water. There we stopped, raised crops, feasted, thanked and praised the Lord for our deliverance — all of which I have seen fulfilled.

In the Spring of 46 I started with the main body of the Church and my father, mother, brother, and three sisters. We all stopped at Council Bluffs to winter when 500 men was called to leave their families and go to fight Mexico. I wanted to go, but my mother was sick and thought she would never see me again if I did.

Here I married in the Spring of '47 and in the

Spring of 150 started to Salt Lake with 2 children and reached there September 15th. 1850.

Since that time I have passed through many scenes of afflictions, joy and sorrow. Since the year '51 I have made three farms and planted two orchards.

where I remained 5 years, sold out and moved to Lehi, stayed 5 years and then moved to Cache Valley, Smithfield and have been trying to make a permanent home 10 years, but time passes on like a river that bears us on to the Ocean of Eternity.

James Downs died January 1, 1882 at Smithfield Gache County, Utah. His wife Mary Ann who was born November 4th, 1827, died March 16th, 1896.

Died- At his homestead, in Bedford Indiana on thursday, August 25th, 1805, of a painful and protracted illness, Joseph Rawlins.

His sufferings were intense but borne with fortitude and without complaint. At his death he was in his ninetieth year, having been born in what is now Boyle County, Ky. in april, 1796. His father died when he was four years old and left him to the care of his uncle, Roderic, who came with him to Indiana in the year 1812, and settled in what is now Lawrence County.

When quite a youth he volunteered in the service under Gen. Geo. W. Carr to suppress depredation on the north western frontier, for stake service he was awarded a rension. Shortly after his return from the army he was married to Sarah McMann, and settled upon a farm near town upon which he remained several years. He disposed of his farm and moved to a cabin in the suburbs of town in 1830, and opened a store of general merchandize on the east side of the square. A few years later he built in connection with the late S. f. Irwin the brick stores on the west side, where he continued in business for about thirty years. His mercantile life was continuous for nearly fourty years. Prevous to coming of the railroad he was extensively engaged in buying and shipping the produce of the country to New Orleans. he sent more produce to market from 1820 to 1850 then, perhaps, any other man in the State, all from this section at that time going in flat boats. also built a large flouring mill on Salt Creek near town, (now operated by the Messrs.. Daggy.) Allthese various branches of business were managed with that there was neither loss, jar nor hindrance.

In August of the year 1855 a great calamity befelf him in the loss of his wife, a highly intelligent lady distinguished for her amiability and superior social qualities. After the death of his wife the duties of the household were placed in charg of his daughters. All of whom still live, and together, with a devotion and tenderness almost unparalleled ministerer to the wants and comforts if their father in his protracted illness.

After his retirement from business, he enjoyed much happiness with his children. There was a charming kindness of feeling between them, each one striving to add to the happiness of the other. At his home a graceful and cordial welcome was always extended to his friends and neighbors, not only to these, but to the ministers of the church to which he belonged and also to many distinguished persons from other sections of the State

In a word, his house has ever been known for its genial hospitality.

He has gone from our sight, but his memory will ever be green to all who knew him. In manners, he was modest and unassuming, in his dealings, up right and honorable, leaving no enemies behind. He now sleeps by the side of his wife who had long preceded him a happy immortality awaits them.

This town, where nearly all the years of his active business life were spent, was noted in its early days (sixty years ago ) for its men of enterprise and business capacity; of these none were more prominent in the encouragement and advancement of its material interests and improvements then Mr. Rawlins. The noble men of the period referred to, and with who whom he associated, with but three or four exceptions, have long since preceded him to "that bourne from whence no traveller e'er returns;) those who are left are tottering on the threshold, and will soon be no more.
